

Sonography Canada Mental Health Survey Results

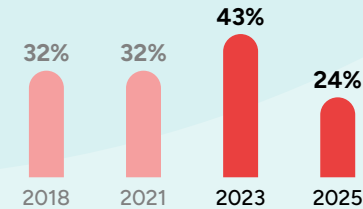

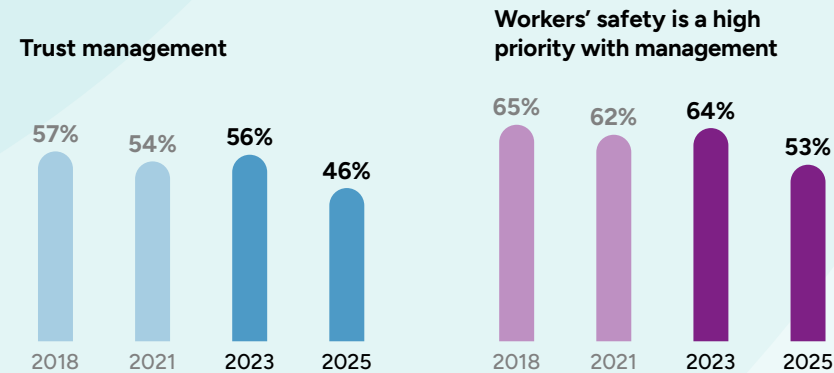
Total number of respondents: 477

Work Life

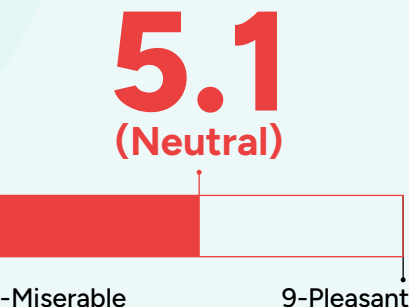
There was a drastic change in the number of sonographers who will look for a new employer in the next year, dropping 19% from 2023 to 2025.



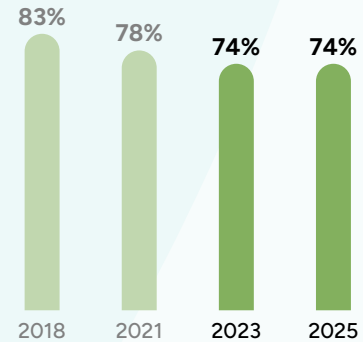
In 2025, the trust of management and in prioritizing the safety of workers with management both dropped ~10%.

Overall job satisfaction remained steady in 2025.



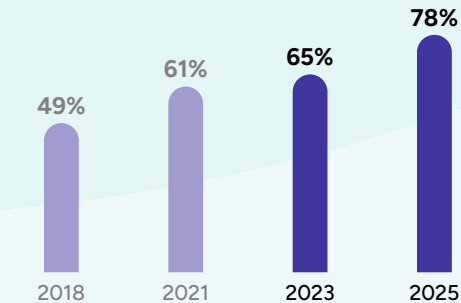

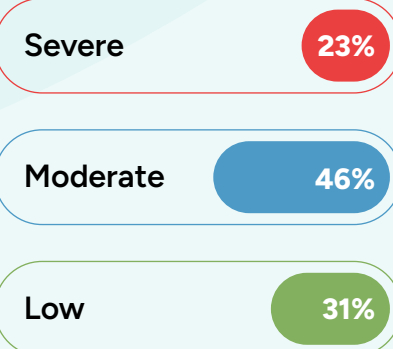
of the small number of unemployed respondents said mental health issues contributed to their current unemployment.

Mental Health Status

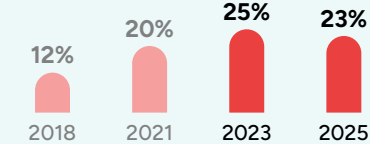
The 2025 values of the Mental Health Inventory remain relatively consistent with those obtained in 2023 for anxiety, behaviour control, and depression. The only notable finding was a 13% positive shift in positive affect.

Although the incidence of nonspecific serious psychological distress has increased since 2018, there was only a minimal change observed between 2023 and 2025.
